### TOWN HALL MEETING REPORT

March 10, 2005

President Bill Allen hosted the first Town Hall meeting at the Bacardi Cup on Thursday, 10 March 2005, with approximately 50 people in attendance. Other officers participating included International Vice President (Western Hemipshere) Claude Bonanni, First Continental Vice President (North America) Joe Zambella, and International Governing Committee Chairman Rick Burgess.

President Allen opened the meeting with a moment of silence for long time Biscayne Bay Star Fleet Member, Frank Zagarino, who passed away after a long illness immediately prior to the Bacardi Cup. Almost all Star sailors honored Frank by placing the letter "Z" just below the # 3 batten on their main sails. Frank won the Bacardi Cup in 1969.

President Allen stressed the informality of the meeting. The officers would listen and discuss any issues of interest. He acknowledged the past Class Presidents Dierk Thomsen, Jack Rickard and Bill Parks and also thanked Barbara Vosbury for her exceptional work as Regatta Manager.

President Allen pointed out that the Star has been selected as the Men's Keelboat for the 2008 Olympic games in China by an overwhelming vote of 33-3 at the recent ISAF meeting in Copenhagen, Denmark. The "men's" designation has brought up the question of gender. Our Class rules and the Class officers firmly and unequivocally support the Star Class as an "OPEN" class. All events under Star Class control will remain

Comments were made on the recent World Championship. Distinguished recognition goes to the organizers at Club Náutico Olivos in Buenos Aires, Argentina for their outstanding efforts for a great championship. There was a welcome return to the international camaraderie found at many past Star Class Championships.

The Annual Meeting summary and results of 2005 for 2006 resolutions will be found in the next issue of Starlights. (Welcome back, Starlights!) A survey will be mailed out in the May Starlights asking Star Class members to answer questions regarding the Class and how its officers can make the Class better for its paying members.

It is with pride that President Allen announced that the 2005 Log will be mailed in about 4 weeks. This is a great improvement over this past year.

Bill also announced that Gull Lake Star Fleet member Tom VanderMolen has been appointed to be the Marketing Manager for the Class. Tom's ideas and enthusiasm will greatly help our fleet building initiative. Welcome aboard, Tom!

President Allen made a special presentation of the Harry Nye award. This award is presented to an individual to recognize his/her outstanding contributions and dedication to the Star Class. This year the IGC voted unanimously to award the Harry Nye Trophy to John F. Koopman. John has been the Star Class Chief Measurer since 1997, has additionally assisted with both regatta management and technical advice for our Class. He was measurer for the 2000 and 2004 Olympic games, and has also served as the Principal Race Officer at the last two Star Class World Championships. A standing ovation and heartfelt thanks to you, John!!

Some discussion was held regarding technical issues, specifically milled keels and weight distribution in the new boats. Cost issues and performance advantages were discussed by members and John Koopman. Both of these areas will be carefully looked at in the future. While the Star has always been a development class, the officers are concerned about any change that adds significant cost to the boat.

A question and answer section followed, highlighting many issues facing the Class today. Some members brought up the crew weight limit. The new proposals for a revised weight limit were soundly defeated in the annual meeting balloting. Several members suggested that crew weight control should be enforced at all of our events. Other members felt that anyone should be able to sail together at local events. There will no doubt be further discussion about this. The officers strongly feel that our current weight limit is fair, and should not be changed at least until after the 2008 Olympics.

In closing, past President Bill Parks thanked President Allen and suggested that everyone go to dinner. Thank you, Mr. Parks.

Mark sailed off the course back to the sailing center where I caught up with him later that day. I can't say he was happy but he took it as things happen and it's not the end of the world. He got his boat repaired and returned for the Commodore's Cup, which he won.

In January I crewed in the South American Championships and met Lars Grael, brother of Torben, and Robert Scheidt. Both of these young men are from Brazil and they both have a sailing resume that anyone would be proud of.

Lars as most of us know was the victim of a very serious accident a few years ago when training in his Tornado was run over by a power boat and lost a leg. He has the most incredible attitude, which he displayed both on and off the water. I never saw him without a smile and always a hello or good morning. By the way he won the regatta.

Robert Scheidt, Olympic Gold medallist in the Laser class, is another one of those people that is you just know is going to be a great addition to the Class. I did not get to talk with him as much as I would have liked but that was only because of time restraints. His on water performance spoke for itself finishing second to Lars. I can tell you that his crew enjoys a very special cereal for breakfast.

So I guess what I'm trying to say in this article is these three additions to the class will only again show that the Star though heaped in tradition is still attracting some of the very best and nicest people in the sailing world.

### Harry Knowles Tune-Up

On April 5, the day before the Western Hemisphere Championship began, the Harry Knowles Tune-up Regatta was held. We had 25 boats on the line for the tune-up races. The winds were east 12-16 knots under sunny sky. Three races were run. The top three finishers were as follows:

First: Ross Macdonald / Mike Wolfs Second: Paul Cayard / Brian Sharp Third: John MacClausland / Brian Faith

In the evening Sir Durward Knowles spoke at the Opening Ceremony of the Western Hemisphere Championship at the Nassau YC with a few words about the class and the high caliber of competition.

### Western Hemisphere Championship

I decided at the last minute to come to Nassau to race the Western Hemisphere Championship because I consider Nassau the best place in the world to race and I have so many good memories of racing here over the past 25 years. 23 years ago I crewed for Vince Brun here, 21 years ago Kenny Keefe and I won the event here, 20 years ago we had the World's Championship here and Kenny and I finished third. Over the years I have won this event 4 times. I love the wind and waves down here.

Typical conditions are 15-20 knots from the South East with 5 foot waves that provide awesome surfing on the reaches and runs. This year, Nassau did not disappoint. In fact, it was breezier than usual; 15 knots the lightest and 30 knots tops.

**April 6, Day 1, Races 1 & 2**: On Wednesday we started the main event with 15-18 knots of wind from the East. Bright sunny conditions, big waves, awesome! We had a 2, 2 and John Dane with Austin Sperry crewing had a 3, 1. We lost the second race of that day by one foot to Dane.

April 7, Day 2, Races 3 & 4: Day 2 was more of the same but the wind moved 20 degrees to the right and increased to 20-25. We led both of those races most of the way, including the last windward marks, and got passed on the final run to the finish each time. Once by Mendleblatt and once by Rick Merriman. I tried not to get down on myself about losing the boats on the final run but it was hard not to be frustrated by the lost opportunities. Still we had increased our lead over Dane/Sperry to 5 points and 9 points over Mendleblatt / Strube. Our score line was 2,2,2,2 for the first four races.

Sailing 20 miles a day in 20 knots of wind in the Star is a workout. I was beat after Thursday. I needed the hot tub and a big stretch last night.

April 8, Day 3, Races 5 & 6: For Day 3 the wind was up another 5 knots to 25-30. What we call men's breeze. The direction had gotten around to 170 as a front is off Florida and will hit Nassau tomorrow. We had a conservative start at the leeward end and we about 6th as the fleet came together 2/3rd of the way up the first beat. The right had been good again and a big group was a head of us including Andy Horton leading, Szabo, Dane/Sperry and Howie Shiebler, Rick Merriman, Ross Macdonald. We manage to pass Merriman, Macdonald and Shiebler just before the first mark to round 4th, behind Dane. We passed him first then Szabo before the gybe mark. Then closed in on Horton at the leeward mark. Horton tacked on us a few times and made us split from Dane. We lost most of our lead on him and rounded the last windward mark just four lengths ahead of Dane and 10 lengths behind Horton. Down the last run, we left Dane and passed Horton to finally win a race!

Kept the boat on a plane and headed for the barn. I decided I could not afford to sail the last race. Might have broken my rig which costs \$5K when you added it all up. We got hauled out, all washed up, packed up and into the club for burgers as the fleet was coming in from the second race.

Another twist to the story is that Brian and I were guests on John Dane's powerboat, the Showdown. It has been fun and we need to thank John and his wife Leslie for the hospitality. John is real happy, as he should be. He is 54 years old and pushed us real hard and beat a lot of good competitors. Glad I decided to come down here.

### **BACARDI CUP**

Mark Mendelblatt and Mark Strube won the 68<sup>th</sup> running of the Bacardi Cup, a series which originated in 1927 in Havana, Cuba, and sailed annually on Biscayne Bay since 1962.

March 6, Race 1: Winners: Howie Shiebler & Anson Stookey

Howie Shiebler and Anson Stookey took first place followed by Mark Mendelblatt and Mark Strube in second place. Two-time Bacardi champion Peter Bromby of Bermuda placed third with crew Rick Peters and six-time Bacardi Cup winner Vince Brun and crew Doug Brophy took fourth place.

One thing noticeable in today's race were the number of boats displaying a large "Z" on their sails as a tribute to long-time Star Class sailor Frank Zagarino who died the day before. The principal organizers of this tribute were Rick Peters, Rick Burgess and Craig Prandini. Various volunteers spent Saturday morning cutting out the Zs for sticking onto the mainsails. According to several competitors, "Zag" as he was affectionately called, was known as the guy who helped out everyone who ever came to Miami to sail.

March 7, Race 2: Winners: Vince Brun & Doug Brophy

Light and shifty air delayed the second day start of the Bacardi Cup in Biscayne Bay. The fleet waited on the water for almost an hour before a light 4 to 5 knot breeze arrived. Six-time Bacardi Cup winner, Vince Brun and crew Doug Brophy were the first to catch a breeze and they never let it go.

March 8: No race was completed. The forecast was for a major front to move through around noon, with winds around 30 mph. The race committee called an hour's postponement of the start, thinking that the weather would pass through. After the hour elapsed, the radar was still showing the front coming but it had slowed. Just before noon, the race committee made the decision to cancel for the day. Because the race was postponed, so too was the mid-week dinner and award ceremony.

March 9, Race 3: Winners: Mark Mendelblatt & Mark Strube

Mark Mendelblatt and Mark Strube moved into first place overall after finishing first and fourth in Wednesday's back to back races.

March 9, Race 4: Winners: Andy MacDonald & Austin Sperry
