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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Western Hemisphere Championship

As we move into the heart of the summer sailing season in the Northern Hemisphere, fleet and district events are taking center stage. Many of our fleet and district officers have taken new initiatives to promote increased participation in summer sailing. Weekday evening racing, with social activities for families, seem to be particularly effective at sparking interest, which often carries over to more serious weekend events.

The Fleet and District Championship events are particularly important, with qualification for the 2006 World's in San Francisco becoming hotly contested. As I have said before, it is very important that the quality of racing at Fleet and District Championships remain high. With the new course formats, shorter courses and more races are now available, which eliminates the need to shorten courses, which has always been against STCR's. This should enhance enjoyment of these events. Race officials should refrain from starting races in less than 5 knots of wind.

I would greatly appreciate feedback regarding the success of local events this summer. We are trying to share ideas from Star sailors around the world in an effort to build participation at the local level. Our Fall Magazine will feature articles about successful fleet building activities, so please forward your ideas and thoughts on what works (and what doesn't) to myself or Starlights editor David Bolles.

The Class recently completed the Eastern and Western Hemisphere Silver Star Championships, in Naples and Annapolis, respectively. These championships were well attended and very well run. I had hoped to attend both events, but family commitments made a trip to Italy impossible. I was able to sail in the WHC, and can attest first hand that the event was first class. Six countries were represented and the racing was very competitive up and down the fleet. Most importantly, I think everyone thoroughly enjoyed the camaraderie and the chance to renew friendships with Star sailors around the US and the world.

There has been some discussion recently about the qualification process for the 2006 World's Championship in San Francisco. As always, the primary qualification method is from fleets with at least 8 boats, where a qualification series is sailed. The second method is from District championships, with numbers determined by participation according to the table in our rules (see LOG). The third method for qualifying is from Silver Star Championships, again based on participation in the most recent Silver Star Championship (LOG). The Judiciary Board has clarified this for 2006, and the qualifying Silver Star events are the 2006 European Championship, the 2006 Western Hemisphere Championship, and the 2006 South American Championship. Those qualifying from these events should inform the Class Office if they plan to sail as a Silver Star qualifier. If anyone subsequently qualifies through their fleet or district, please let the office know so the Silver Star slot can be passed down.

As always, I greatly appreciate the feedback from sailors concerning how to increase enjoyment from sailing the best Class in the world.

EASTERN HEMISPHERE CHAMPIONSHIP

April 17-21, 2006 Savoia Yacht Club, Naples, Italy

Monday, April 17: After the tune up race on Easter Sunday, the "Eastern Hemisphere Championship" tried to start on an opening day. However, the wind often changed direction and was always less than necessary for racing. The sailors waited for the wind to settle in until 3:15 p.m., when the race committee decided that nothing could be done. The skippers, crews and the jury went back to the Savoia Yacht Club, the host yacht club for this international event.

Tuesday, April 18: For a second day a valid race could not be completed. On Tuesday afternoon, following numerous protests from the contestants, the jury decided to abandon the race of that morning which was initially ruled valid.

Wednesday, April 19, Races 1 & 2: The first valid race of the Star Eastern Hemisphere Championship, organized by the Circolo Savoia, was held on Wednesday morning, April 19. Finally the Gulf of Napoli had enough wind with so that the Championship was able to start.

The first race was won by the Polish team of Kusznierewicz and Zycki, followed by the Germans Pickel / Borkowski, and the French Rohart / Rambeau. The second races was won by the Americans Dane / Sperry.

Thursday, April 20, Races 3 & 4: Two of the big favorites in the Star Eastern Hemisphere Championships won the two races of the day, sailed, finally, in good winds. In the first race, the French team of Rohart / Rambeau finished in front of the Swedes Lööf / Ekström. In the second race, the places were reversed, with Lööf / Ekström winning

In the first race, the only boat that managed to sail in front of Lööf / Ekström and Rohart / Rambeau, were the Italians Diego Negri / Luigi Viale, who finished third. A former Laser Champion, Negri has been sailing the Star for a year with excellent results. In fourth were Roy Heiner / Alex Breuseker of the Netherlands. Another Italian team, that of Silvio Santoni / Sergio Lambertenghi, sailed with the leaders during the race and finished fifth. In the second race the Americans Mark Mendelblatt / Mark Strube were 3rd, New Zealand's Hamish Pepper / David Giles were fourth.

Friday, April 21, Races 5 & 6: In the first race of the day, Rohart and Lööf were side by side, ending up in the low 30's. But by the third mark of the second race, Lööf had definitively won the regatta, with Rohart falling back to 5th overall.

The Swedish team of Fredrik Lööf and Anders Ekström won the 2006 Eastern Hemisphere Championship. They received the winner's trophy given by Pippo Dalla Vecchia at the Circolo di Santa Lucia in Naples. Lööf and Ekström, during the six races, had stiff competition from the French crew of Xavier Rohart and Pascal Rambeau, who are also two-time Star World Champions.

Second overall in the 70 boat fleet was taken by the American team of Mark Mendelblatt / Mark Strube. On the podium in 3rd place was Luca Modena and Michele Marchesini, and Diego Negri with Luigi Viale as crew finished 4th.

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2006 ANNAPOLIS NOOD

April 28-30, 2006 by Carroll Beek McCallum

On Thursday April 27th, visiting Stars began arriving at Severn Sailing Association for the Annapolis NOOD Regatta. Gold medalist Magnus Liljedahl was one of the first competitors to arrive, straight from the European Championship, to crew for Sam Hopkins, and to help Sam rig and tune his mast. Barbara Vosbury, Second District Secretary and Star Class Regatta Manager, was there to find ample space and to welcome everyone.

About 20 Stars had the two smoothly running hoists at Severn to themselves. All other NOOD classes and the rest of the Star Fleet launched from the Annapolis Yacht Club boatyard.

Elliott Oldak, Fleet Captain of the Annapolis fleet, was in the Severn boatyard lending a hand to visitors and commenting on the local conditions, saying "....if there were ever a question of which side to go, the current might determine that you stay toward the shore." This information, given in such a mild tone that it was easy to overlook, was predictive of the weekend conditions.

While Thursday had been a balmy day with little wind ruffling the waters of the Severn with the pros complaining that there would be a drifter, it was surprising to wake up to a 20 knot breeze coming up the river on Friday. The Stars were appointed to the starting line nearest the mouth of the Severn: one nautical mile off the "spider" and gathered at 10 AM with 18 Etchells, 33 J22s, and 21 J24s. There were 24 Stars on the line, starting after the Etchells. At 11AM, when the warning gun sounded, the wind was blowing about 18, gusty and out of the east-northeast. It was sunny but the water was cold. Crews were mini-hiking and getting wet. There were three races, all of them five legs, finishing up wind where the Severn Sailing Association had stationed a second committee boat, so that following each finish the next race could be started as soon as the fleet returned to the starting line. The races were thus run with great efficiency.

Elliott's current was running powerfully. After the races a rumor circulated that the Susquehanna dams had been opened and the water released increased the flow of the ebbing tide. The left side of the course, nearest the shore, was generally favored all weekend except when pressure, clearer air and shifts gave a right slant some advantage. Cold water was also a factor. One team had to retire on Friday because the crew began to feel hypothermic effects.

Another factor for two teams on Friday was the apparent need to use a focusing lens in the proximity of Guy Gurney. An encounter with Sam Hopkins after rounding the leeward mark in the first run of the first race tore out Guy's spreader bracket. Guy was forced to miss the rest of the day's racing while he replaced the bracket. He protested and won redress, calculated as the average of the rest of his races. As Guy won a race on Sunday, his redress average was a high 8.8 points.

Saturday had two light wind races, both again five legs. First district skipper Carroll McCallum, aided by a very able local crew, Kris Wilson, placed second in a shifty second race with the current again running interference. With the wind dying,

the third race for Saturday was cancelled. Fotis Boliakis commented, "Today was not a good day," he said of his 10th, and 17th for the day. "This fleet is very competitive and today was the day for full power through the chop as the wind got light. It's only my second time racing in Annapolis, and I missed the current. I wasn't aware of how strong it was at the top mark. I went where I thought the breeze was, the middle of the racecourse. The boats that went deep left had less breeze, but no current. It was challenging, but tomorrow's another day," pronounced Fotis.

Sunday's winds picked back up to 8 to 10 and very shifty out of the North East. Two five leg races were sailed. The first race was won, no focal glasses needed, by Guy Gurney sailing with Roman Gotsulyak.

The final results show that the First District sailors took 7th, 8th, 9th, and 14th places: Guy Gurney / Roman Gotsulyak and Fotis Boliakis / Darin Jensen of Central Long Island Sound and Tomas Hornos / Luis Hornos of Boston Harbor, finishing consecutively, with Carroll McCallum of CLIS back in 14th.

In the trophy giving, coffee mugs were awarded for daily first three. Lands End polo shirts and duffle bags were awarded for first three in the overall standings. Champion Snipe sailor Henry Filter of Annapolis Star Fleet, with Rodrigo Meireles crewing, won in the Star Class, followed in second place by Hans Fogh (1984 Soling Bronze medalist) with crew David Caesar of the Lake Ontario, Canada Fleet.

With 24 boats on the line, the Star sailors showed off their class. Only the J22 and J105 classes had more boats on the line. The other 14 fleets participating in the NOOD averaged only 12 boats per fleet.

MID-MEDITERRANEAN DISTRICT 2006 14th DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIP

May 5-7, 2006 Report by Giulio Gatti Translated by Melinda Berge

Diego Negri and Luigi Viale won the 14° District Championship, part of the Regata Circuito Ultraclassic Star 2006.

Six beautiful races, sun, food, beer and much enjoyment. That, in a few words, is the description of the Championship of District 14 in 2006. Taking part in the racing in Gaeta were also five non-Italians, holdovers from the European Championship in Naples, raising the sailing level of the regatta. Thanks above all to the presence of Flavio Marazzi, second in the World Championship in Gaeta in 2004 and 4th in the 2004 Athens Olympics.

On Friday in the first race we had several attempts at a start. After two starts there was a black flag with a short line.

Caught with black flag were Luca Simeone / Nando Colaninno and the Irish team of O'Connell / Peel which made the rest of the championship difficult for them — not leaving space for errors. It was Flavio Marazzi / Etienne Huter, traveling as a missile, who won the race. Diego Negri / Luigi Viale were second and Pierpaolo Christofori / Paulo Fulvio third. Giampiero Poggi / Giovanni Stilo, who had been in first place, lost out in the last leg and finished 4th.

There was time for a 2nd race. Simeone / Colaninno, spectators during the first race due to their BFD, found the correct side in the shifting conditions of the day, and had a strong win, making sure it was understand that they have not spent the winter asleep. Paolo Semeraro / Giancarlo Del Col took second and the Irish team of O'Connell / Peel were third

(making up for their BFD in the 1st race), Diego fourth, and the good Swiss fifth.

Saturday was a day typical of Gaeta. At 1 pm sharp, the wind stabilized. The start was at 1:30 with a wind of 3 m / s and increasing. Semeraro went off the line, tacked to the right, and just like in the handbook, was first at the first mark and stayed in first. Second were Giulio Gatti / Manuele La Porta, third Negri / Viale. The finishes were beginning to be repetitive with fourth being Marazzi and Giuseppe Ritucci / Livio Giacummo were 5th.

A quarter hour later the second race of the day was started. The wind continued to increase to $6\ m/s$ and still went right. Marazzi won, the Irish were 2nd, and Diego was third and was on top of the leader board for the championship but they still could be passed by one of the other 3 top finishers. Luca and Nando held on and took 4th.

We started the third race of the day with 8 m/s, still to the right. The wind held until the end of the first leg, then jumped to the left by the first mark and then returned to the right sufficiently to upset the prevailing order of finishes. The Irish won the race, Diego took a second and won the District

Championship (as no Italian could beat him but would race tomorrow to make it "total", against the non-Italians), Pierpaolo Christofori / Paulo Fulviotake took another 3rd, Semeraro was fourth and Marazzi finished fifth. We arrived at the dock after this long day very hungry, but there was beautiful warm pasta and beer waiting for us.

The last day and last race was in the standard conditions of Gaeta. The wind came up punctually at 1 pm from 210. Then it turned to the right with the sun. Luca and Nando, by now with no chance of the final victory, worked hard to get ahead of the Ukraine boat with the red numbers and win. The Ukrainians (Konstantin Datenko / Alexandr Euseenko) finished second in front of the Irish in 3rd. Semeraro / Del Co was 4th and Marazzi, who perhaps had not done his calculations well, was fifth (he needed a 3rd to take the championship) and gave the District title to Diego and Luigi.

At the prize giving there was a touching moment when Luca and his mother remembered Luca's father. The winners Diego and Luigi had cargos of prizes, were smiling contentedly and are awaiting their new boat. Thanks to Luca and the boys of the Base Nautica for putting on the regatta.

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2006 WESTERN HEMISPHERE CHAMPIONSHIP

May 23-26, 2006 Annapolis Yacht Club by Melinda Berge

May 23, Races 1 & 2: The first day of racing for the Western Hemisphere Championship was under sunny skies but with a cold, gusty northwest wind of 15 knots with a temperature in the high 50s

The first race was a 2 mile, four leg windward-leeward course set at 325 and changed to 335 for the 2nd upwind leg. Dane / Sperry were first around the windward leg of the first leg after having stayed to the left side of the course, taking advantage of the lessening ebb current at the top of the leg. Following them were Reynolds / Haenel, O'Connell / Peel, Murray / Palfrey and Anosov / Caesar. VanderMolen / Wolfs were first at the 2nd windward mark. Following them were Murray / Palfrey, Reynolds / Haenel, Dane / Sperry and Conde / Hunn. This order held to the finish, except with Reynolds / Haenel and Dane / Sperry exchanging places and Cramer / Bjorn taking 5th ahead of Conde / Hunn.

The second race brought lighter, but still gusty winds with larger shifts up to 45 degrees.

May 24, Race 3: Racing was delayed due to light winds. One race was finally competed in the late afternoon. Winds finally

settled in at 6-10 knots from the south after having clocked from the north during the long waiting period.

May 25, Races 4 & 5: Warmer but cloudy with temperatures in the mid 60sF. The wind slowly built from the south and at noon there was 15 knots. The first race of the day was won by Rick Merriman / Rick Peters, followed by Andy Macdonald / Brian Fatih and George Szabo / Eric Monroe for a southern California sweep of the top three.

In the 2nd race the southern California contingent continued strong with Mark Reynolds / Hal Haenel winning the race and Erik Lidecis / Michael Marzahl finishing 2nd. John Dane / Austin Sperry were third and are tied with Reynolds / Haenel for first overall in the regatta. Just one point back is Australia's Iain Murray / Andrew Palfrey.

May 26, Race 6: The fleet had to wait until early afternoon for the wind to show up from the south at 12-14 knots. John Dane and Austin Sperry, with their 6th in the race, won the Western Hemisphere Championship followed by Mark Reynolds / Hal Haenel in 2nd and George Szabo / Eric Monroe in 3rd.

Winning the final race (their 2nd first place in the regatta) were Rick Merriman / Rick Peters, followed by George Szabo / Eric Monroe and Argentina's Fabian MacGowan / Frederico Engelhard.
