COLUMBUS DAY REGATTA

Larchmont Yacht Club, Larchmont, New York October 8 – 9, 2005

Thierry Magon de La Villehuchet has once again invited Star sailors from near and far to compete for the Stanley K. Turner Memorial Trophy in a regatta hosted by Larchmont Yacht Club.

Larchmont Yacht Club was founded in 1880 and houses many old paintings and trophies of historical and nautical interest. The Stanley K. Turner Memorial Trophy was dedicated by the Western Long Island Star Fleet to honor the memory of a young man who was the first Larchmont member to be killed in World War Two. Stanley Turner had won a Silver Star in the Atlantic Coast Championship in his Star "Migs" #893. Not long after his victory Stanley joined the Navy. His death was reported in the Pacific in February 1944.

The trophy is a dimensional model of "Migs" #893. The wood mounting is covered with small brass plaques bearing the names of past winners. The first winner was Skip Etchells in 1944 and 1945, followed by many well-known skippers. In 2004 the regatta was won, in a fleet of 14, by Andy Horton / Brad Nichols (who will not be attending this year because they are in San Francisco in hot contention for the Star Class World Championship.) In 2005 the regatta was won by Thierry de La Villehuchet in a fleet of 9 contestants. (For further history see story by Jane Lawrence in November 2005 Newsletter.)

2006 TRI-DISTRICT CUP

JOHN MACCAUSLAND WINS BY WIDE MARGIN

FIRST YEAR STAR SAILOR SECOND

This spring of 2006 John Manderson started sailing Stars. This fall he has won the second place award in the Tri-District competition. Previous to this, for ten years, John sailed Snipes, and describes himself as a "persistent" Snipe sailor, though he could also be called accomplished. He was second in the 2002 Snipe North Americans and thirteenth in the 2003 Snipe World Championship in Landskrona, Sweden. Clearly he has brought his persistence to the Star. This summer he sailed in the Miles River Spring Regatta (placing third), the Arms White, the First District Blue Star (placing 7th), the Sunapee Open (10th), Ned Hay (6th), Bedford Pitcher (21st), Nutmegs (8th), and intends to sail in the Larchmont Columbus Day Regatta and the Annapolis Star-Etchells Regatta before taking his boat to Miami. John is a member of the Mid-Connecticut fleet of the First District.

When asked what interested him in Stars, John explained that over the years he has talked about Stars a lot with Augie Diaz and George Szabo at Snipe regattas, and also has several other friends, including Tom Olsen and Tony Rey who sail Stars and rave about them. In 2004 John and Henry Filter watched a day of the Olympic Trials in Miami and though intrigued, John was initially put off by the cost of campaigning a Star. But in the winter of 2005-2006 John's grandfather, who was a great sailor (mostly big boats; cruising and ocean racing) and hugely important in John's life, fell ill. John told his grandfather a week before he died that he was going to buy a Star, name it "Rosebud", which was his grandfather's nickname, and "take him sailing with me." So after his grandfather died last winter John found the boat and bought it sight unseen from Peter Wright. John says of Stars, "I had never sailed one but I am now just so intrigued with the boat; it is the most interesting boat I have sailed."

John has found a dedicated and able crew in Matt Semler who modestly says his own sailing "has very little to do with our success in the Tri-District Cup. John's driving... both on and off the water... gets most of the credit." Matt grew up keelboat racing. "Mostly one design stuff on Atlantics in Blue Hill, Maine." "I've always known the Star to be the pinnacle, and it was just dumb blind luck that I found John last April having just bought his first Star and looking for crew. Having raced sailboats since I was six, it was a real experience to get in the front of a Star and have almost no idea what was going on.... "The mast does WHAT????" But the truth of it is that there is no other boat like it, especially once you figure out that a droop hike is one of the coolest and most comfortable ways and places you could sit on any boat."

John and Matt were the *only* team to compete in all three of the Tri-District Regattas. The Tri-District Championship awards are given to the top two skippers that achieve the best scores in two out of three regattas, one regatta sailed in each of the three districts: Arms-White in the First, Sunapee Open in the Twelfth, Oxford Wind-up in the Second. For each regatta, the skipper's average finish is calculated, with no throw out. The best two out of three regatta averages are added to get the final score.

Eleven skippers sailed in two of the three regattas. Of these the best total average was 4.3 for John MacCausland (who won the Arms-White and was second in the Sunapee Open) and 13 for John Manderson (who was tenth at the Sunapee Open and third in the Oxford windup).

2006 OXFORD FALL WINDUP

Mid-Eastern Shore Fleet Tred Avon Yacht Club, Oxford, MD September 30-October 1, 2006

John Vanderhoff has been racing Stars since the early 80's.Robert McVey, now deceased, was a yesteryear Star boater that moved the North Chesapeake Bay Star Fleet to Havre de Grace and got John involved in the class. Now the Havre de Grace Fleet races every Thursday night in the Susquehanna, giving John a lot of practice sailing in 0 - 6 knots of breeze.

John says "I really enjoy the interactions with Star people and am hard pressed to think of a more enjoyable activity than attending a Star Regatta."

Although John Vanderhoff has sailed the Fall Windup many times, he has not won before. He says, "this win was rather dramatic for me, winning the regatta by about a foot in a photo finish of the third race." The third race, on Sunday, John Vanderhoff lead around the first two marks, but Eliot Oldak took the lead at the top of the second weather leg before the final run to the finish, with John Manderson rounding the weather mark second, Vanderhoff rounding third and Bear Hovey rounding 4th.

Friday before the Fall Wind-up the weather was unimpeachably beautiful. Sam Hopkins and Remo Casasco, John Manderson and Matt Semler, Will Swigart and Carroll Beek went out to practice in the late afternoon. The wind out of the Tred Avon blew John Manderson and Matt Semler clear across the Choptank on a single surfing reach. It was a spell binding afternoon but the weather forecast and the locals cast a dour outlook for Saturday, shaking heads and saying –light, shifting to southwest then rain and a front overnight.

They were only partly right. As the day progressed the weather telescoped and the blue skies became covered with a complex high mix of clouds with 10 gusty knots under them and chop with the wind out of the south. Before the start we saw shifts at 200 but the RC held with 180 degrees and the line was fair. The current flowing more or less west out the Choptank, had max ebb at about 1:30. We started on time at 11 AM.

After the race, Bear Hovey said he had been sailing in that general area the previous week and the right had always paid. He had gone right in the first race but Manderson had gone farther and had passed him on a shift.

A gust on the first run caught Karen Alt hiking out and her crew standing out at the mast. They rolled to weather, dug the pole and lost the mast.

It was shifty, but the RC started us at 180 for the second race as well. Then we were half way up the weather leg when the mark boat came by hailing everyone that the start had actually been postponed. The RC reset the mark at 200. The sky was very complex; every kind of cloud in the book was up there somewhere. The gusts were up to 15 and we had a few drops of rain.Bear's experience in the area led him well and he won the race. On the quick run back to the club the sky lightened and the wind dropped so that the afternoon after the race had the same sunny cast we'd had in the morning. The front had passed while we were racing.

The big hoist, ample dock and yard space, beer, and a delicious crab dish for dinner made for a very civil afternoon and evening.

Sunday our start was an hour earlier. It was postponed however as there was not much wind in the blue sky. The only clouds were off in the East over the land. The tide was ebbing and the wind was from the southwest against the ebb. We had one false start and the RC reset the mark to the west.At the first leeward mark they reset the weather mark again, farther west, in very light air so that on the final run we chose between the left, the shore side of the run, where there would be less current, or the right, more mid channel where there seemed to be more wind. The middle proved to be good in this dichotomy.

The races were run by Richard Lippincott. Assisting him, aboard the large beautiful blue RC boat, was Jack Quinn, and in the mark boat, was Bill Wolf. Ashore, Vicky ran the club, and in the yard, Steve was very helpful.
