### MARBLEHEAD NOOD

July 26-27, 2003 by Nelson Stephenson

The Marblehead NOOD was a Great Success for the Star Class. Thirty-three boats registered and 30 boats sailed the event. We had a great turnout with really good support from the Chesapeake fleets and Lake Sunapee.

The Star "field trip" to Marblehead NOOD was a great trip overall. Conditions were wonderful. Eastern Yacht Club was very welcoming with great food and beverage. Winds were a bit lighter than expected but still enough breeze to make the boats go for all 4 races. After the light air regatta for the District 1 Championship (Blue Star) it was really great to sail in mid-range wind conditions. Oscillating shifts combined with current sweeping across the course from right to left made for excellent Star racing.

Doug and Bob Schofield won the first day with two bullets. They were also rewarded with "Boat of the Day" honors at Marblehead NOOD on Saturday. The second day they proved themselves human with a 10th in the 3rd race and then recovered with a final bullet in the last race.

Guy Gurney with Sergey Leonidov crewing came second for the regatta with very consistent finishes of 4, 4, 3 and a final 7 for 18 points. Ron Sandstrom was 3rd with a 2, 8, 1, 10 for 21 points, sailing with Steve Braverman as crew.

The final race was signaled less than 5 minutes before the time limit of 14:30. Had there not been a final race, Guy Gurney and Ron Sandstrom would have tied for the regatta with 11 points (and Ron would have won the tie breaker) with 13 points for the Schofields.

September, 2003

It was an interesting last day for the Star Fleet. John Lombard got disqualified from the third race after hitting Bert Collins and Guy Avelon in the stern. Ben Cesare was OCS in the third race. That really mixed up the scores with 4 races and no throw-out.

Some boats decided not to sail the last race, returning to the docks only to find that the lifts were jammed with Etchells, Sonars, J-24's and Vipers. Leaving early netted those boats very little in terms of time. Since the lifts were used (and overused) all day, the power breaker tripped at around 6:00pm, shutting down the lifts until the power company could come and reset the breaker.

Only two "incidents" of interest to report in the Star Fleet, one on Saturday and one on Sunday.

On Saturday Fotis Boliakas was on starboard tack boat going upwind in the third leg of the last race of the day and Joe Bainton (then in second place) was a port boat going downwind to finish on the fourth (last) leg. When the two boats came together Joe healed the boat to windward and the two rigs came in contact. Fotis lost his rig with a great bang, the break coming just at the spreaders. Joe's rig stayed in the boat but was badly bent when the port upper was hooked about a foot below the tip. Joe finished and then retired from racing and both boats were towed in. Joe and Fotis were seen later on the deck at Eastern Yacht Club sharing a beverage and laughing with each other.

John Bainton built a big lead in the last Race on Sunday but lost his mainsheet after rounding at the first windward mark. One side of the mainsheet ran through the blocks and out of the boom. As they were trying to fix it the other side ran through and they lost the mainsheet entirely and retired while leading the last race. Nelson Stephenson rounded in 4th at the first upwind leg of the final race and his mainsheet also ran through the boom. After effecting emergency repairs Nelson finished the race, single sheeting the boom for last upwind leg.

Everyone had a great time and the "Big Regatta" experiment was a resounding success. Many people were asking about the Star boats and it was great exposure for the Star Class. Steve Braverman worked hard to make this happen and we owe Steve a great deal of credit for promoting an event that turned out to be a great showing for the Star Class in a very visible regatta.

## SANTA BARBARA LIPTON July 26-27, 2003 By Rick Peters

Santa Barbara Yacht Club held a great regatta over the weekend of July 26-27. Only 10 boats showed up but it was probably the best wind conditions so far this year. The wind was from 240 building from 10 to 15kts on Saturday then 10 to 20kts on Sunday! Andy MacDonald sailing with Jon Rogers won all three races on Sunday in tight racing action. The R/C provided snacks and bottled water for all competitors. Everyone got back in and had big smiles as they enjoyed the complimentary beer, wine, and appetizers on the SBYC deck.

On Sunday we headed out at 11:15 for the noon start, the reports were for more breeze than on Saturday. The first race was in moderate 10-12kt winds, the team of Sperry / Hiatt managed to finish ahead of MacDonald / Rogers, breaking their streak of wins. Race 2 started out in 12-15kt winds, Macdonald / Rogers and Brown / Monroe were called over and had to circle back and restart.

Sperry / Hiatt led the entire race, but needed a miracle to pull off the overall win. As the wind built to 20kts for the final downwind leg it came when MacDonald / Rodgers buried the whisker pole and broke the mast.

At the last leeward mark the team of Chuck Beek and Jacob Blik failed to drop their jib halyard and pulled the grommet out of the head, the shock caused the clevis pin to come out of the headstay so the jib went in for a wash leaving them unable to sail upwind to the finish. They sailed downwind past the pier while retrieving the jib and fixing the headstay, then sailed back past the harbor entrance and all the way to the R/C to cross the finish line before the time limit expired!

After packing the boats up, trophies were awarded in the clubhouse were we enjoyed more beer, wine and a pasta bar. Thanks to everyone at the SBYC for putting on a great event and providing for all the Star sailors needs, thanks to Mother Nature for the great conditions.

## ISAF STRIKES AGAIN! Multinational Crews Prohibited at the Cadiz Event

ISAF has a new set of regulations which will not allow multinational crews in ISAF events. This situation has been brought to a head as a result of George Szabo (SDB/USA) being informed by Jerome Pels, Director of Sailing, ISAF Secretariat, that he could not use Christian Finnsgard (Bk/SWE) as a crew at the Cadiz event. The same is true for Sergei Horetski, sailing for Belarus, who wanted to use as his crew Hubert Rauch from Germany.

Pels wrote as follows:

ISAF regulation 17.3 and the Notice of Race apply: 'All competitors must be a national of the country which the competitor represents. Mixed nationality on a boat in an ISAF event is not allowed'.

The Cadiz NOR does indeed make it clear that this is ISAF's intent:

4.1 ISAF eligibility as per Appendix 2, Regulation 19 is required of all competitors. Each competitor shall be a national of the country of the national authority entering him or her.

On the ISAF web site (<u>www.sailing.org</u>) you can download the 2003 ISAF Regulations. In regulation 17.3 you will see the prohibition against multinational crews.

This is contrary to Star Class tradition. We can all think of examples of multinational teams sailing in our events. In the 2002 World's Christian Finnsgard (SWE) sailed with Augie Diaz (USA). In the 2001 World's Gavin Brady (NZL) had George Iverson (USA) as his crew, and almost won. And there have been multinational teams which have won the World's: Alex Hagen (GER) with Marcelo Ferreira (BRA) in 1997, Buddy Melges (USA) with Andreas Josenhans (CAN) in 1978 and 1979, Tom Blackaller (USA) with David Shaw (CAN) in 1980. Having multinational crews at the World's has probably happened almost every year in the history of the Star Class, some winning, most not, but never once have there been any complaints or problems.

The whole concept now being put forth by ISAF is patently absurd! If you know an ISAF officer please contact him to let him know that this prohibition is not acceptable. While for the moment regulation 17.3 appears to affect only the Cadiz event, and should the Star boat remain Olympic equipment also the 2007 ISAF Combined World's, the fear is that regulation 17.3 will extend to other Star Class events in the future.

## CARL EICHENLAUB HONORED By Jan Harley

Sailing's wizard of boat repair, Carl Eichenlaub (San Diego, Calif.), will have a prominent role in the opening ceremonies of the XIV Pan American Games in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. Eichenlaub was elected to represent the entire U.S. delegation -- 640 athletes competing in 36 sports -- and will carry the U.S. flag into Juan Pablo Duarte Olympic Stadium on Friday evening, August 1, 2003.

The 73-year young boat builder, who has been a mainstay of the U.S. Olympic Sailing program for 27 years, made his first trip to the Pan Am Games in 1979 as the team's Official Boatwright. While the trip to Santo Domingo marks the seventh time he has accompanied sailors to the Pan Am Games, Eichenlaub has also supported the U.S.A.'s Olympic Team-Sailing onsite at six Olympic Regattas ('76, '84, '88, '92, '96 and 2000).

His dedication to the athletes was never more apparent than in 2000 when he suffered a broken hip at the Athlete's Village in Sydney and maintained his duties while on crutches. After a week of R&R at home in California, he returned to Sydney to assist the athletes of the U.S.A.'s 2000 Paralympic Sailing Team. Recognizing Eichenlaub's outstanding contributions, US SAILING, national governing body for the sport, awarded him its most prestigious award, the Nathanael G. Herreshoff Trophy, in 2000.

Eichenlaub typically travels to each event with a specially outfitted 40' container that holds, among other things, a swedging machine, drill press, compressors, as well as a microwave for curing resin. Frequently approached by foreign athletes with damaged equipment, Eichenlaub seldom refuses a request for assistance once his work for the U.S. team is complete.

In Memoriam Joan Watts Champion Sailor 1957-2003

Joan Laurel Watts, 45, of Churchton, MD, died June 9 in Annapolis. Watts was born in 1957, in Evansville, IL. She graduated from the University of Michigan with a degree in naval architecture and marine engineering.

During her career she worked for several naval engineering firms, among them Supervisor of Ships in Boston where she worked on the restoration of the USS Constitution. At the time of her death, she worked for the American Bureau of Shipping as a senior engineer.

She was a successful racing sailor for many years and was to win a coveted "Blue Star" in the Star Class. As skipper of Shadow, Watts won the Chesapeake District Blue Star in 1986. She finished 51<sup>st</sup> of 79 in the highly competitive 1987 Star Class World Championship in Chicago.

In 1984, Watts teamed with skipper Cory Fisher Sertl and fellow Annapolis residents Dina Horwitz Kowalyshyn and Ramsey Murray Alexander to win U.S. Sailing's Adams Cup while representing the Chesapeake Bay YRA.

Watts remained active in sailing throughout her life racing in women's events, in the Penguin class, and aboard the J/30 Big Kahuna, among other boats.

She is survived by her husband, Alan L. Drew IV, a sailmaker at the UK loft in Annapolis. Drew crewed for Watts in the 1987 Star Worlds and in recent years, the couple built a wooden racing Penguin.

"Joan was a great sailor, and she always will be a great role model," says Annapolis sailor Barbara Vosbury. "She was a formidable competitor - you never discounted Joan on the water - but she took the time to help and inspire other sailors as well."
